For 16 years the Ronald McDonald House on the grounds of Crumlin Hospital has provided a vital home-from-home to the families of critically ill children.

Our mission is simple. We keep families together, close by their sick child, so that they can care for each other and cope with the unimaginable trauma they are facing.

But today, as work begins on the New Children's Hospital, we are faced with our greatest challenge.

In order to continue to provide the same level of essential care and support to families we must build a new House, at the very heart of the new hospital campus.

But that great challenge is also our greatest opportunity.

For the last 16 years Ronald McDonald House has relied entirely on the incredible support of the our volunteers, our business partners and all the inspiring individuals whose vision and compassion have kept our House open for the families who need it most.

And today we need your vision, your compassion and your generosity more than ever. With your support we now have the once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to build a House for all the families who will need us. 


A custom-built haven for families at the heart of the New Children's Hospital.



After many years of debate and negotiation construction on Ireland's new, and urgently needed, children's hospital is finally underway. The **New Children's Hospital (NCH)** will bring Ireland's three leading children's Hospitals (Temple Street, Crumlin and Tallaght) together under one roof for the very first time - creating a new national centre for paediatric care.

Providing families with immediate and unhindered access to the hospital is essential. As a result the Health Service Executive (HSE) have provided a prime and central location for the new Ronald McDonald House in the new hospital grounds - enabling families easy access to their child's ward without ever having to step outside.

How Ronald McDonald House will meet the specific needs of families with critically ill children.

Planning Permission for the new Ronald McDonald House is now fully approved.

To ensure that our new House could continue to provide the same remarkable support to the families of seriously ill children, Ronald McDonald House Charity assembled a unique group of medical experts, engineers and stakeholders to help design the new House. At the heart of that advisory group was the voice of the families who have stayed here. Every inch of the new House was designed to meet the specific and unique needs of parents and families of seriously ill children.



Direct access to the Hospital for families.

When a child is critically ill their condition can change at a moment's notice. The new Ronald McDonald House will sit at the very heart of the new hospital campus – allowing families immediate and easy access to the hospital.



53 fully equipped family rooms.

A good night's sleep is priceless. Each family room in the new House will be ensuite and will sleep a family of four – with extra sleeping arrangements available for larger families.



Ensuring privacy when it is needed.

The new House will contain a specially designated 'Quiet Room' where families can find a few moments of peace and relaxation.



Play areas and recreation rooms for children of all ages.

Research indicates that play is an important part of a child's ability to cope. The new Ronald McDonald House will have numerous play areas specifically designed for critically ill children and their siblings.



Family living areas to Enable normal family life.

Togetherness is essential in order to maintain a sense of normal family life. The new House will be divided into family living areas providing kitchen, playroom and laundry services.



Keeping families in constant contact.

Each room will provide parents with a direct and dedicated phoneline to their child's ward in the hospital so they never feel removed from their children and can be reached immediately.



“Aideen was very sick for a long time after her transplant. Having the House on the grounds of the hospital meant we could take her out for short periods to see her brother and sister. They went out to the garden to play together and we could sit down and have a family meal. Aideen was still very sick but to get her out of the hospital for even an hour meant the world to us.”

The average length of a family's stay in the Ronald McDonald House is 24 days.


The longest stay by one family in the Ronald McDonald House has been 889 nights – that's **over 2 years**.


The new Children's Hospital will be the centre for the care and treatment of critically ill children from all over Ireland.

The importance of the Ronald McDonald House - A doctor's view.

A medical perspective on the incredible and tangible impact of the Ronald McDonald House on the families of critically ill children from Dr Aengus O'Marcaigh, Consultant Haematologist Our Lady's Hospital Crumlin.



When I started in Our Lady's Children's Hospital I saw families sleep in hallways, sitting upright all night in chairs beside their child or lying on paper thin mattresses literally under their child's bed as there was no room for them. I am delighted to say that because of the Ronald McDonald House Charity parents have been able to get a full comfortable night's sleep – a healthy breakfast and a sense of normality that enables them to engage 100% in the care and recovery of their child.

Children don't cope well with uncertainty and having to spend time in hospital is very stressful for them. As adults, we are more resilient – we can draw upon existing relationships, experiences and information to help us cope with our illness – children don't have that advantage – they only really know what mum and dad tell them and they rely totally on that.

That in turn puts huge strain on parents and can be very emotionally draining on the parents, and tired, stressed and emotionally vulnerable parents can mean that the needs of the child can go unmet.

If we can provide children with certainty and assurance that they can wake up and know their parents are there for support, we know that recovery for those children is far less traumatic.

I have seen the difference in how the child recovers, knowing mum and dad are close by. There is less stress, less worry – our patients, your children, feel more secure.

How the Ronald McDonald House transforms the lives of children and their families.

Over the last ten years extensive research has been conducted to fully understand the needs of the families of critically ill children and to properly gauge the benefits of staying in the Ronald McDonald House for both parents and children.

The results were simply staggering.

Repeated studies prove that support from family and friends is the single most important ingredient when it comes to coping well with trauma.

Keeping families together:

Reduces stress

Many parents suffer clinical levels of anxiety when their children are hospitalised for more than three days. Staying in the Ronald McDonald House can greatly reduce stress levels by allowing families to stay together and providing the simple comforts of a good night's sleep and a home-cooked meal every day.

Removes financial worries

Most families could never meet the cost of supporting their critically ill child in hospital. In total the 20 families currently in the Ronald McDonald House in Crumlin hospital save over €700,000 a year in accommodation, meals and parking costs.



Better quality of sleep

Parents who sleep at Ronald McDonald House enjoy greater sleep quality than those who stay at the pediatric bedside.

Increases quality of life

A study of over 2,000 family members found that families believed the proximity of the Ronald McDonald House to their hospital helped them stay together during a difficult time and improved their perceptions of their quality of life and of their sick child's recovery.

Provides unique solidarity and support

What makes the Ronald McDonald House so unique is the extraordinary bond that forms between the families who stay here. Parents who stay in the Ronald McDonald House single out the great solidarity with other parents in the House as a major factor in their ability to cope.

Improves coping skills

Research published by Family, Systems & Health (2013) stated that families staying close to the hospital are provided with important benefits for their psychological well-being – vastly increasing their ability to cope and support their child and participate more thoroughly in their child's care.

Plays an important role for Families

A strong majority of hospital administrators worldwide agreed that Ronald McDonald Houses play a significant and important role for families. Over 90% agreed that Ronald McDonald Houses reduced stress and costs to families.

The Ahearne Family

- One mother's moving portrait of life in the Ronald McDonald House.



“There is no amount of words that can express how important the Ronald McDonald House is.”

Susan Ahearn's beautiful young daughter Olivia has spent much of the last two years fighting for her life in Crumlin Hospital and King's Hospital London, while surgeons tried to remove the tumour on her liver and stop the constant bleeds in her abdomen.

And for every minute of that terrifying journey Susan has remained at her daughter's side – often sleeping on the floor beside her. Susan recalls those long dark nights.

“There were so many times we didn't know if Olivia would wake up or survive. She had three ten hour liver surgeries in two years. And each time there was no guarantee she would survive.”

But Olivia's big brother Christian also needed the care and devotion of his parents. Christian was born with a condition called hydrocephalous, and had already undergone three critical neuro- surgeries before Olivia was even born. So while Susan remained with her daughter in hospital, her husband Colin had to stay at home in Cork to care for Christian.

“Both your kids need you and I need them. And I need my husband. There was one stage where I didn't see Christian or Colin for nine and half weeks. You're not prepared for that massive upheaval. Watching Olivia cry herself to sleep every night because she missed her brother and her father. That was our life for two years. It was awful. It was an absolute living nightmare.”

But when Susan and her family moved into the Ronald McDonald House, everything changed. Colin and Christian were able to regularly come up from Cork - meaning they could remain together as a family without ever leaving Olivia's side.



“ The doctor came running up to me saying Olivia would have to be airlifted to London for emergency surgery. I walked over to the Ronald McDonald House and I stood in the kitchen and I didn’t know what to do. I just stood there in a daze. I was in complete shock. I remember thinking ‘my legs aren’t working’.

Then another mother, whose daughter was very sick, came over and just held me. I remember her saying ‘let it all out now and then go back’. And I just cried and cried and cried. Then Jenny and Sheena, the House managers, packed my suitcase and walked me back over to the hospital, literally holding me up.

Without the Ronald McDonald House at that moment I would have fallen to pieces completely.”





Construction on the new Children's hospital has already begun.

The new hospital will open in 2022.

Martin Foy knows just how important it is for a family to be together when faced with serious illness.

Just moments after Martin's wife Margaret gave birth by C-Section to twin baby girls it became clear that one of the babies was critically ill. Baby Rosie was immediately rushed to Crumlin Hospital with Martin at her side, while Margaret remained in Cork with baby Muireann.

For the next ten days their family was separated as doctors began to discover just how seriously ill Rosie was. Rosie was diagnosed with a cleft palette but soon it was discovered that she had serious issues with her heart and spine.



“I thought I was strong. But when you hold a ten-pound baby in your hands as she's fighting for life with every breath – and every second you think you might lose her – that's when you learn how weak you are and how much you need the constant support of other people. That's what the Ronald McDonald House provides for families. The support I got from the staff from the other families and from my wife and child, none of that would have been possible without the Ronald McDonald House”.

After ten agonising days, Margaret was allowed to travel to Dublin to finally hold her baby daughter for the very first time. Martin and his family remained together in the Ronald McDonald House for a further 8 weeks. And over the next few years they would turn many times as Rosie underwent 13 separate surgeries.

Today Rosie is healthy and well but Martin and his family will never forget the extraordinary support that they received in the Ronald McDonald House. That is why Martin now serves as a member of our board and was a key figure in ensuring that the wishes of the families were incorporated into the design of the new Ronald McDonald House.

Why we call it Ronald McDonald House

The incredible story of a little girl called Kim.

In October 1974, a brave little girl called Kim Hill was being treated for leukaemia in St Christopher's Hospital in Philadelphia PA. While she was being treated her parents slept on chairs and ate out of vending machines. They knew that there had to be a better way for families to help care for their child.



Kim's father Fred was a well known football player with the Philadelphia Eagles. So he turned to his team mates for help and began a remarkable community fundraising effort – one that continues to grow every day. He recruited the help of Philadelphia Eagle's general manager Jim Murray who in turn asked his friend Ed Rensi for help. Ed was regional manager for McDonald's and offered to donate all the proceeds of the now famous Shamrock Shake to the fund. In return the House was named after the restaurant's mascot, Ronald McDonald.

And so, in October 1974, the first Ronald McDonald House was opened. And today Kim's wonderful legacy continues to grow. Right now there are 365 Ronald McDonald Houses in 43 countries all over the world.
